Alive at 25 Overview

The Mission of the Alive at 25 program is to help young drivers choose safe driving practices, take responsibility for their behavior, and be aware of the typical driving hazards.

- **▶** Written and designed for drivers 15-24 years of age
- 4 ½ hour classroom setting
- No behind-the-wheel driving or training
- Taught by certified law enforcement officers





Alive at 25 Structure

that bridges the gap between what teens learn in driver's education and what behaviors and skills they need to become responsible, crash-free drivers.

workbook exercises, class discussions and role playing. Young drivers learn how to take control of situations by understanding the consequences of their actions. It offers a balanced approach to help teens not only regulate their driving behavior, but also helps them deal with the actual issues that can influence their driving behavior.

Why we NEED the Program

The #1 KILLER of teens in the United States is car crashes!

30 individuals, ages 15-24, die everyday from motor vehicle collisions





Why we NEED the Program

Breakdown of how 32,885 People DIED in Motor Vehicle Collisions:

Seat Belts & Child Seats = 11, 426 deaths

Drunk Driving = 9,322 deaths

Large Trucks = 529 deaths

Motorcycles = 4,502 deaths

Young Drivers = 7,106 deaths

If you don't DIE, the annual cost of Motor Vehicle Crash Injuries is:

\$99 Billion!







The Statistics

Drivers aged 15-24 make up 14% of all drivers,

But, they make up 27% of all collisions.





141 young adults between the ages of 15-24 DIED in 2013 in SC due to vehicle collisions.

























Did you know?

SC Graduated Driver's License System

To get a SC beginner's permit:

- Be at least 15 yoa
- Pass a written test

Restrictions of beginner's permit:

- Only drive with someone 21>yoa.
- Not drive midnight-6am without parent.



To get a SC conditional/restricted:

- Be 15-16 yoa
- Have 6 months beginner's permit experience
- Complete driver's education
- Drive 40 hours (10 at night)
- Pass a driving test

Restrictions of conditional/restricted:

- Not drive 6pm-midnight without someone 21>yoa
- Not drive midnight-6am without parent
- Not carry more than 2 passengers
 <21 (except to/from school/family)























Did you know?

Motor vehicle crashes are the NUMBER ONE cause of death for people in the 15-24 age group → 75% of all deaths!

- EVERY day 30 people in this age group die in a crash
 - → 49% of these crashes are alcohol-related
 - **▶ LOWEST RATE OF SEATBELT USAGE**

What does the research show us?

Distracted Driving, hands down, is the leading cause of vehicle collisions for young adults.

- CELL PHONE/TEXTING
- GPS
- applying make-up/shaving
- MP3 players





- staring
- smoking
- tuning radio
- eating and drinking





















Texting while driving is Deadly

The Allstate Foundation found that 1/3 of teens admit to texting while driving.

Driving skill is measurably impaired by text-messaging.

Driving while text messaging is just as dangerous than drinking and driving or driving under the influence of marijuana.

Writing text messages creates a significantly greater impairment than reading text messages, but both are harmful.







Targeted Approach

The top factors contributing to fatal crashes in this age group are:

- ⇒ SPEED
- **→** DISTRACTED DRIVING
- → ALCOHOL
- **OCCUPANT RESTRAINTS**

2013 South Carolina Statistics

South Carolina Driving Facts:

- In 2013, 141 people, age 15-24, died as a result of traffic collisions.
- Roughly 1 in every 5 traffic deaths in the state was a person age 15-24.
- 70 out of 111 killed in automobiles (63%) were NOT wearing seatbelts.

**Note: 5 unknown seatbelt usage, 6 pedestrians, 18 motorcycles, and 6 mopeds





South Carolina Statistics

SC Annual Statistics:

- In 2007, 278 drivers and passengers, ages 15-24, died in traffic collisions.
- In 2008, 227 drivers and passengers, ages 15-24, died in traffic collisions.
- In 2009, 190 drivers and passengers, ages 15-24, died in traffic collisions.
- In 2010, 172 drivers and passengers, ages 15-24, died in traffic collisions.
- In 2011, 172 drivers and passengers, ages 15-24, died in traffic collisions.
- In 2012, 176 drivers and passengers, ages 15-24, died in traffic collisions.
- In 2013, 141 drivers and passengers, ages 15-24, died in traffic collisions.

This is a 49% reduction in fatalities!

Alive at 25 was introduced to South Carolina in February 2007 in hopes of reducing teen fatalities!!






South Carolina Statistics

- From February 2007 through today, over **82,000** students have participated in the Alive at 25 course state-wide. Of those, 40 participants (37 drivers and 3 passengers) have been involved in fatal collisions within the State of South Carolina.
- Fatalities among drivers ages 15-24 have decreased since 2006 statewide.
- In a recent study by the SCNSC, 98% of DDC-Alive at 25 participants have said that they would change their driving behavior after taking the course.



Are You a Potential Statistic?

- Watch The Ron and Josh Story video

Session Two

Recognize the Hazard

- Examine two types of hazards Driver and Driving
- Watch Seven Deadly Drives video
- Discuss alcohol, drugs, and all state laws
- Understand how hazards, impaired driving, speeding, distractions, fatigue, not wearing a seatbelt, and too many people in the car increase risk.
- **Examine how to react to different hazards found when driving**
- Watch Recognize the Hazards video





Session Three

Understand the Defense

- Identify situations that lead to feeling out of control as a driver
- Discuss how to take control behind the wheel and various consequences
- Discuss tips for staying in control
- **■** Watch *Two Friends* video





Session Four

Act Correctly, In Time

- Discuss and analyze positive characteristics of 15-24 year old age group and how they can make safe driving decisions
- Analyze hazards and discuss how to handle each one; stopping a drunk friend from driving, stopping a street race, texting while driving, and driving while tired
- Commit to making a change in driving attitudes and behaviors






